Core of present buildings dates from 16 th c, and lies beside moat which is possible remains of Medieval fishpond. Notable historic elements still extant include 15 th c timber framing, octagonal ended buttresses, three light window with ovolo brick mullions and surround, projecting bays and early example of queen struts in roof structure.' |
